## LAST WEEK

Laine Norton introduced Brian Hastings, CEO of the University of Nebraska Foundation. Hastings expressed his thanks for a warm reception to Nebraska and the University of Nebraska Foundation. He's an Ohio native and graduate of THE Ohio State University.

The University of Nebraska Foundation has one goal — assist the University with meeting their goals on every campus. The Unlimited Possibilities campaign had the goal of raising \$1.2 billion and is now north of \$1.5 billion before it has met its conclusion. Fundraising for the Buffet Cancer Center was one of the most impressive fundraising efforts he has ever seen. The new nursing facility and veterinary diagnostic center are both new building projects and efforts taking place in Lincoln, in addition to a new building and increased programs for the College of Business. And the University of Nebraska Foundation is still active in the Innovation Campus programs.

The current focus is on finishing the current campaign strong, planning what comes next, and a longer term strategic planning process that is currently under way. The University of Nebraska Foundation has 60 staff on the "front lines" who see about 8,000 people per year. Twenty-three of those are for UNL. There will be growth and expansion to meet the needs of the University, but they will continue to outwork and outsmart their competition.

Philanthropic trends show giving up 1.5% over last year, but still 11% behind 2007. Nebraska has benefited from the stable economy and a generous spirit among Nebraskans. Cost of fundraising is \$0.15 to \$0.25 per dollar. This was the best fundraising year ever for University of Nebraska Foundation, thanks to the generous spirit of Nebraskans.
